I feel as if I must write to you concerning Fluids and Thermodynamics, chapter 4- the first law of thermodynamics. As I think that no book can do more for the teaching of thermodynamics.

Together with the learning enhancement sessions you have made the subject of thermodynamics very accessible, in fact in the last enhancement session it was exhilaration solving the gas turbine problem as a class. The maths I have found does not progress much from Further Maths but it is approached in a different manner at a much faster pace...


This is roughly the same problem for all the subjects, apart from yours.




